Commissioner Dahmer led those present in prayer. Commissioner Hevener called the meeting to order

Minutes of the March 4, 2025 meeting, on motion of Commissioner Dahmer, were unanimously approved.

The Commission heard from Attorney Danita Alt, counsel for Roy Bowers and Diana Bowers Smith and Attorney Joe Caltrider, counsel for Maria Bowers Miller and Clinton Bowers regarding controversy over the appraisement filed in the Clinton Ann Bowers Estate. Fiduciary Commissioner M. Zelene Harman was unable to attend, but submitted a written statement and recommendations to the Commission.

After reviewing all documents, Commissioner Dahmer motioned to accept the recommendation of the Fiduciary Commissioner for the parties to proceed to the Circuit Court for resolution. Commissioner Bennett seconded the motion, with Commissioner Hevener confirming agreement. Attorney Alt and Attorney Caltrider accepted the decision of the Commission.

Greg Greenwalt, William Ours and Mike Crites, representing the Hardy County Committee on Aging, discussed with the Commission the lack of a dialysis center serving the area. The previous center was moved to Keyser, WV. They are in talks with a potential company that would come in and set up a dialysis center that would serve the local and surrounding areas. They were requesting contributions towards the first year of rent and possible remodeling to help encourage the company to move to the area. Hardy County has already committed funds along with a letter of support. They will also be talking with the Grant County Commission and the Town of Moorefield and Petersburg.

The Commission tabled any decisions until the next meeting to obtain additional information.

Bob Horan, Mayor of Franklin, asked the Commission to form a committee, of which the Town would be willing to be a part of, to discuss the Mon Forest grant for the WVU Land Use Law Clinic to help develop a comprehensive plan for the County.

Michelle Connor, the Town's Mon Forest representative, added that the comprehensive plan could help attract resources to the County and has nothing to do with the wind turbine issue. Jennifer Taylor-Ide reaffirmed the interest in the relationship of the Friends of Beautiful Pendleton County and a comprehensive plan, not just because of the wind turbines, but also due to the potential of the plan of being able to promote the County's resources.

The Commission agreed to invite the Town to the meeting when it is scheduled.

Maintenance: Mon Power was installing the street light across from the Courthouse during the meeting. This will provide some much-needed lighting at night.

Rick Gillespie, Emergency Management Coordinator, mentioned that part of the 911 Next Gen equipment had been delivered.

He also stated that he and Commissioner Hevener had met with representatives regarding the National Radio Quiet Zone last week and felt optimistic that they were heading in the right direction.

Mr. Gillespie announced that the Elk Mountain traffic camera was now in service and has been added to the County's traffic camera website page.

Sherry Mongold, Director of the Seneca Rocks Regional Development Authority, stated the Authority had been approved by the West Virginia EDA for their LED grant in the amount of \$83,000. The County Commission had previously approved a \$41,500 match.

Karen Pitsenbarger, County Administrator, reported that they are reviewing the contract with Lantz and expect to sign by the end of the week.

Commissioner Dahmer read a response from Clearway Energy regarding the Commission's request for information on Liberty Gap Wind Force plans. They stated there are many unknowns at this time and are working with federal agencies to understand some of the impacts of current changes in the government. They will share information when they receive it and are willing to discuss the project with the Commission and the residents of the County if the project moves forward.

Mike Alt reported that there is some movement in the State Legislature to obtain monies for the EMS Salary Enhancement fund.

Commissioner Hevener has met with EMS personnel and others to discuss the lack of funding from Charleston. He stated that the County could help now, but would need to look at alternative funding for the future as the County could not feasibly provide these funds long-term.

Commissioner Dahmer made a motion, vote unanimous, to appropriate funds to cover the EMS Salary Enhancement monies the State had promised to fund, with the stipulation that if funds are received, they would be used to reimburse the County.

The Commission reviewed the budget for fiscal year 2026 for General County and Coal Severance. On motion of Commissioner Dahmer, vote unanimous, the budget was approved.

They reviewed the 911 budget for fiscal year 2026 and on motion of Commissioner Bennett, vote unanimous, the budget was approved.

The Commission reviewed the employee timesheets for the month of February.

On motion of Commissioner Dahmer, vote unanimous, the Commission agreed to support the Music in Our Schools Program.

There were no fiduciary settlements or exonerations.

The following appointments of administrators, executors, etc., done by the County Clerk in vacation of the Commission were approved on motion of Commissioner Dahmer, vote unanimous.
